In his book *What the Robin Knows* Jon Young reveals that within any given species, a variety of bird calls convey information about a bird's condition and territory. A singing bird establishes the absence of danger, while silence or calls of alarm denote the presence of a predator.

When Jesus taught about trust in our heavenly Father, he didn't point to religious leaders or his own disciples as examples. "Look at the birds of the air," he said. "They neither sow nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them" (Matthew 6:26). This heavenly Father "richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life." The first rule when you are in a hole is "Stop digging!" Sometimes circumstances or relationship reversals or emotions drop us into a pothole in life. We find ourselves staring at the world from grass-high level. In guilt or anger we may seek relief by digging away furiously, only deepening our dilemma. "Not necessary," says the psalmist. "Take a break from digging. Drop the shovel and reach hands and heart towards the God who draws you up, restores your life from 'the pit,' who turns mourning into dancing." It takes faith (courage) to let go of our own efforts and surrender the whole of things to God. But the call to "let go and let God" is a cliché for good reason. It works!

How often do we judge people by their appearance, job description or background? One of the most remarkable qualities Jesus displayed was his complete acceptance of all.
